Social Determinants of Health Copyright-free Healthy People 2030

Healthy People 2030, U.S. Department of Health and Human Services, Office of Disease Prevention and Health Promotion. Social Determinants of Health (SDOH) are the conditions in the environments where people are born, live, learn, work, play, worship, and age that affect a wide range of health, functioning, and quality-of-life outcomes and risks. (U.S. Department of Health and Human Services)



Participatory Budgeting Cycle

DESIGN THE PROCESS

A steering committee that represents the community creates the rules and engagement plan.



Through meetings and online tools, residents share and discuss ideas for projects.



DEVELOP PROPOSALS

Volunteer "budget delegates" develop the ideas into feasible proposals.



The government or institution funds and implements the winning ideas.



Residents vote on the proposals that most serve the community's needs.
