




## What is Qualitative Methodology?

- How people make sense of the world
- Inductive
- Exploratory
- Transferrable, not generalizable
- Not simply interviews and focus

groups



## Qualitative Research in Community Engagement

- Community drives research and data
- Participatory in nature ("democratic")
- Assesses researcher positionality
- Reflexive in nature
- Can be narrative based, arts based



## Community-Engaged Approach to Qualitative Research

#### **Facilitators**

- Bi-directional and iterative
- Equitable partnerships
- Culturally responsive dissemination of findings
- Builds capacity for future partnerships and research

#### **Barriers**

- Partnership sustainability concerns
- Limited funding
- Varying degrees of readiness and training needs

## Background

#### WHAT WAS THE PURPOSE?

- Identify commonalities and shared struggles experienced by 14 BIPOC organizations belonging to the Racial Equity Coalition (REC) to inform collective action.
- Understand what creates positive and challenging experiences with funders.
- Identify recommendations for funders to become more culturally responsive.

#### WHAT WAS THE ISSUE THAT BROUGHT REC TOGETHER?

- Persistent educational racial disparities exist.
- REC organizations require community-centered funding processes to support and sustain their culturally integrative youth services and system change work aimed at eliminating educational disparities.

# Findings: Recommendations for funders to enhance responsive funding practices

- Incentivize collaboration instead of fostering competition.
- Listen to communities to create culturally responsive definitions of success and measurement strategies that are aligned with BIPOC organizations' values versus imposing Eurocentric values.
- Eliminate barriers undermining organizations' abilities to secure grants such as colonial constructs that don't acknowledge cultural traditions or socioeconomic factors.
- Arrive at mutually agreed upon approaches with grantees versus having a "one-size-fits-all approach."
- Honor the connections BIPOC organizations have with their communities.
- Resist tendencies requiring BIPOC organizations to prove capacity more than white, mainstream organizations.
- Equitably allocate funding to BIPOC organizations versus funneling disproportionate dollars to white-led organizations.
- Provide unrestricted, multi-year funding to allow BIPOC organizations greater agency.
- Offer more BIPOC-aligned funding opportunities such as "hub-and-spoke" models and participatory funding that allow communities to determine how to prioritize and allocate funding.
- Actively listen and be responsive to how communities want to set priorities and determine what constitutes success versus telling them what needs to be done.
- Support smaller BIPOC organizations to help them grow capacity.

### **Recommendations for Action**

- Funders work with communities to co-determine how to revise grant-making processes.
- Funders actively listen and be responsive to communities.
- Funders recognize how BIPOC organizations are uniquely positioned to serve BIPOC communities due to their deep connections with the communities they serve.
- Funders uproot dominant practices that are not inclusive.
- Funders learn more about the power of BIPOC coalitions to address persistent educational disparities.
- Funders hire more BIPOC individuals from affected communities into leadership positions.
