To build and maintain trust with community partners, we need to demonstrate that our relationships do not end when the grant is over and that community partners have an active role in decision making by sitting on governance committees.



Institutional policies like institutional review board and tenure review processes need to be reviewed and updated to keep up with participatory and community-driven research.



To advocate for the value of community-engaged research in the academy, higher education administrators need to be educated on the accomplishments, benefits, challenges, and impact that community-engaged researchers have made in their respective communities.



Finding mentorship for community-engaged research exists both inside and outside the institution. Create networks with community-based organizations, build rapport, and see how projects can develop organically based on shared goals and mutual respect.
